

Advanced-Entry Seminar

After grappling with huge, what-am-I-doing-with-the-rest-of-my-life questions, thinking about your Advanced-Entry Seminar (AES) is a process that will actually be fun! The AES is a required course taken during your first semester that cultivates a sense of belonging and inclusion, and exposes you to SU's expectations for your academic work. Though each faculty member teaching in the program organizes their seminar around a different topic, all of the seminars work towards developing a common set of skills, including information literacy, reading critically, writing cogently, and participating in informed discussion and debate. Your AES experience will also be your first exposure to Southwestern's Paideia philosophy of making connections. You will learn how seemingly disparate ways of thinking can be fully interwoven and how to connect liberal arts learning with the extra- and co-curricular activities and organizations in which you engage.

ADVANCED-ENTRY SEMINAR TOPICS

Now, don't let the intriguing titles mislead you. Seminars are real multidisciplinary courses focused on exploratory topics that will help you think about what you are learning in your other courses and even in your out-of-classroom experiences. Seminars are not intended to be introductions to majors—although you may end up liking the subject area so much that you consider it as a major!

Seminars meet for 10 hours during Welcome Week, which begins Monday, August 18, and continue meeting twice per week through early November. One of the highlights of the AES program is First Symposium, at which students present their work to the campus community.
