

2024–2025 Philanthropic Overview

Thank you to the alumni, parents, and friends who contribute to the continued success of the University and our talented students.

Southwestern Annual Fund

Donors once again contributed generously to the Southwestern Annual Fund during the 2024–2025 fiscal year. Gifts totaled more than \$1.5 million.

Gifts to the Southwestern Annual Fund support the areas of greatest need in the most responsive way possible. These unrestricted gifts allow the University to address changing priorities and new initiatives as they arise. These funds may be used to support students' curricular and co-curricular experiences, faculty research and creative works, and other institutional objectives.

President's Council

Donors who give \$1,500 or more in the current fiscal year are recognized as members of the President's Council. The giving threshold to qualify for membership increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500 last year. Each President's Council member is vital to the University's success and enriches the *Southwestern Experience* for students.

KEY PRIORITIES THAT PRESIDENT'S COUNCIL MEMBERS SUPPORTED THIS FISCAL YEAR INCLUDE:

- ***Southwestern Annual Fund:*** Over \$1.4 million went toward the University's greatest needs and to support new initiatives to enhance the student experience.
- ***Capital Improvement Projects:*** More than \$1.3 million was given in support of capital improvement projects, including the renovation of Mood-Bridwell Hall, the construction of the multi-purpose sports complex, and the creation of the Welcome Center.
- ***Current Restricted Funds:*** Approximately \$2.6 million supported high-impact experiences, advising and retention initiatives, Pirate athletics, academic departments, the Emergency Fund for students, the fine arts, Greek life initiatives, and student scholarships.
- ***Endowment:*** Over \$3.2 million was donated to the endowment to support student scholarships, undergraduate research, and high-impact experiences.

Thrive: The Campaign for Southwestern University surpasses \$150 Million Fundraising Goal

After eight years of historic support, Southwestern is celebrating the successful completion of *Thrive: The Campaign for Southwestern*. The most ambitious fundraising campaign in the University's history saw the Southwestern community come together to donate over \$161 million, surpassing the campaign's goal of \$150 million.

The *Thrive* campaign has transformed Southwestern in the classroom through major investments in student success and academic excellence and on campus through the renovation of historic buildings and the construction of several new facilities. The campaign also saw record-setting donations to the University's annual and general support funds, ensuring the impact of *Thrive* will continue to be felt for years to come.





Mood-Bridwell Renovation Complete

The Mood-Bridwell Hall renovation was completed in summer 2025. Originally built in 1908 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Mood-Bridwell now offers students a state-of-the-art, 21st century learning experience. The building features electronic classrooms, a new skylight, gathering spaces, a coffeehouse, and a reopened upper terrace for outdoor learning and events. 

Alumni Come Together to Support Eric Selbin Endowed Scholarship



When Professor of Political Science Eric Selbin arrived at his retirement party in April, he was thrilled to see so many current and former staff, faculty, and students in attendance. He was even more thrilled when he learned about the surprise they had in store for him: a new endowed scholarship in his name.

"It was overwhelming in the best possible sense," says Selbin, who spent 33 years at Southwestern. "It's such an incredible honor."

The scholarship was the brainchild of Selbin's daughter Zoe Cordes Selbin '15. "Growing up, I saw how much my dad cared about his students and wanted to see them succeed," she says. "This was a way to honor him while allowing him to continue to support students even after he has left Southwestern."

More than 100 alumni, parents, students, and friends made gifts toward the scholarship, which provides need-based support for students interested in building a better, more just world.

"Supporting the scholarship was a great opportunity to give back to Southwestern in a meaningful way," says Sara Lucero Moore '95, who donated with her husband, Dennis Moore '95. "Dr. Selbin is a genuine, lovely human who encourages everyone to be their best selves, including himself. He was instrumental in my Southwestern journey."

Selbin is grateful to his family, including his wife, Helen Cordes, and daughters Zoe and Jesse Cordes Selbin, for their encouragement and understanding throughout his career.

"Southwestern has been incredibly good to me," he says. "My students have mentored me, taught me, and been patient with me. I gained so much more from them than they gained from me."

Family Endows Scholarship in Honor of Beloved Sister

Kim Tipton '76 taught in some of the highest-poverty school districts in Texas for more than 30 years. While she enjoyed sharing her love of reading in the classroom, her generosity went far beyond teaching; she frequently purchased clothing, shoes, and supplies for students in need. When her brother Jim Tipton decided to establish a scholarship at Southwestern in his sister's honor after her death in December 2023, he knew exactly who it should support.

"The scholarship is designated for first-generation students," Jim says. "Education is the key to unlocking opportunities and breaking the cycle of poverty, and so many times our children need that extra help. Kim was a big believer in that."

Karen K. Subieta, who lived in the same residence hall with Kim and developed a lifelong friendship with her, invited Jim to the President's Appreciation Dinner and Homecoming Worship Service last fall. Family and friends also gathered to honor Kim during a special lunch that weekend. Jim had already donated to an existing scholarship Subieta had established in honor of Kim and her other Southwestern friends, but the weekend inspired him to endow a separate scholarship in Kim's name alone.

"It was very moving," he says. "I could see why the school meant so much to Kim."

Karen believes the scholarship is the perfect way to recognize Kim and her commitment to her students.

"It will enable students like the ones she taught to follow in her footsteps," Subieta says. "She would be so honored."

When their daughters were recruited to play volleyball at Southwestern, Mark and Patty Kuras P'23, P'25 were happy to donate to the team to help them train, travel, and compete. After joining the Parent Leadership Council (PLC), they were able to take their support to a whole other level.

“Being part of the PLC allows you to make a difference not just for your own student, but for all the students at Southwestern,” Mark says. “The PLC is involved in just about every phase of campus life. You understand the vision and can give your input. It feels like you’re involved with the direction of the school.”

In addition to supporting the Parent Fund (part of the Southwestern Annual Fund) and other priorities, PLC members serve the University in a variety of ways, from writing notes to prospective Southwestern families to connecting students with internship opportunities. They also attend two meetings a year on campus.

“During the meetings, they take you to tour the sites and see the new construction,” says Patty. “You actually get to see the improvements that are happening because of the contributions of the PLC.”

Mark and Patty were especially grateful for the relationships they built with staff, administrators, and fellow parents, many of whom attended their youngest daughter’s graduation party in May.

“I remember thinking that it kind of felt like we were graduating, too,” Mark says. “The PLC became a second family. It was very rewarding. We’re really going to miss it.”

Foundation Giving

Texas Methodist Foundation Invests in the Power of Education

The Texas Methodist Foundation (TMF) partners with Methodist-affiliated churches and nonprofits across Texas and New Mexico to grow through investments, loans, grants, learning and innovation, gift planning, and endowment services. Southwestern is just one of the many organizations TMF has generously supported since its founding in 1938.

“Texas Methodist Foundation’s support of Southwestern goes back many years,” says Wendolyn Abel, TMF’s vice president of grants ministry. “Our shared relationships and values create incredible opportunities for donors to align their deep faith and love for the educational experience at Southwestern.”

That support has been wide and varied. TMF administers endowments that support the University annually and grants scholarship support to help students pursue their educational goals. For many years, TMF has partnered with the University to implement the Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Jr. Scholarship program, which helps high-achieving students attend Southwestern. TMF also serves as trustee on at least one significant charitable remainder trust where Southwestern is the sole beneficiary.

Historically, Southwestern has had a special affiliation with the Methodist church. Its founders were Methodist missionaries, and the University is accredited by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church. Education has been at the heart of the Methodist movement since its beginnings, and Southwestern continues this commitment through the liberal arts tradition.

“We deeply value our relationship with Southwestern and its commitment to intellectual inquiry and interdisciplinary learning, which is essential in our rapidly changing world,” Abel says. “TMF is a proud supporter of the students, staff, and alumni of Southwestern.”

Greek Life Giving

Loyal donors ensure fraternity and sorority members benefit from chapter scholarships, leadership development, and modernized chapter spaces.

Greek life at Southwestern is more than tradition; it's a dynamic, student-led community rooted in leadership, service, and lifelong bonds. Greek-affiliated students now make up 35% of the student body—the University's highest percentage in decades.

“Our data tell us that students involved in the Greek life system at Southwestern have impressive GPAs and the highest graduation rates,” says President Laura Trombley. “Greek alumni go on to become pillars of their home communities and remain involved with Southwestern long after graduation.”

Alumni Couple's Love for Lifelong Learning Inspires Estate Gift

When Maria Betancourt-Smith '77 and L. Wayne Smith '76 say Southwestern instilled a love for lifelong learning in them, they aren't kidding.

Betancourt-Smith went on to earn both her master's degree in education from Stephen F. Austin State University (SFA) and her doctorate in curriculum and instruction from Texas A&M University after graduation. She worked as a teacher and administrator for more than 40 years and currently serves as an adjunct professor at SFA. Smith spent decades working as an accountant and running an industrial supply business with his brother before earning his master's of business administration degree from SFA in 2022.

"I got my MBA about 10 days before my 68th birthday," Smith says. "The absolute most important thing that Southwestern did for me was instill a desire to continue learning, and that carries on to this day."

That desire to learn extends beyond academic interests. Smith is a licensed private pilot and certified firefighter, and Betancourt-Smith is a certified scuba diver and competitive photographer.

The couple has been supporting the University for decades. In 2018, they decided to make a lasting impact through an endowed scholarship. Most recently, they included Southwestern in their estate plan in order to ensure future students have access to the same experience they did.

"Wayne and I have been the recipients of opportunities that we want others to have as well," Betancourt-Smith says. "We want the education Southwestern offers to be perpetuated and experienced by others so they can flourish."



Bequest Gift Helps Ensure a Bright Future for Southwestern

Even after their passing, George and Barbara Brightwell continue to make a profound impact at Southwestern. The University recently received a bequest gift from the Brightwells' estate totaling just over \$1 million.


The Brightwells began their careers at Southwestern in 1977. Barbara served as the dean of student development and as an assistant professor of psychology until 1984, while George was the University registrar and an assistant professor of economics and business until his retirement in 1997.

The couple were pillars in the Georgetown community. Following her time at Southwestern, Barbara served as director of community relations at Georgetown Hospital, now St. David's Georgetown Hospital, and helped establish the Georgetown Community Clinic, now Lone Star Circle of Care. George served on the board for a number of local nonprofits, including the Getsemani Community Center, Georgetown Boys and Girls Club, LifeSteps Council on Alcohol and Drugs, and Ride On Center for Kids (ROCK).

In 2017, the couple established the Barbara and George Brightwell Endowed Scholarship Fund at Southwestern. Shortly after their passing in 2023, the Central Texas Community Foundation posthumously honored the Brightwells with the Elizabeth Brenenstuhl Unsung Hero Award, which celebrates those who display exceptional dedication to supporting local nonprofits with their gifts and talents.

Alma Thomas Theater Stage Receives Name Thanks to Estate Gift

The stage inside Southwestern University's Alma Thomas Theater has a name for the very first time. The estate of Roger Edward Davidson '49 has made a generous bequest gift of \$1 million to Southwestern to dedicate the Davidson Stage at the Alma Thomas Theater.



Davidson was a staunch supporter of the performing arts and the proud father of Donald Davidson '81, Christopher Davidson, Amanda Davidson, and Eric Davidson.

"Dad was always supportive of music and the arts wherever he lived, from Colorado to Texas," Davidson's son Chris says. "It was important to him to leave something to inspire young people to follow in pursuing and supporting music and the arts. He always looked back fondly on his time at SU and how it shaped his adult life."

Davidson served in the U.S. Navy before attending Southwestern, where he played in the band and orchestra and graduated with a music degree. He was a part-time musician throughout the 1950s and 1960s. After moving to Grand Junction, Colorado, following his retirement, Davidson became active with the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra. He joined the organization's board of directors in 2002 and served as its vice president until his passing in 2011.

Donor support allows Pirate Athletics to provide exceptional experiences for Southwestern's 500+ student-athletes.

New Indoor Simulators Take Golf Program to the Next Level

Several generous donors recently came together to support Southwestern's men's and women's golf program through the addition of two indoor golf simulators. Coach Greg Sigler, a four-time SCAC Men's Coach of the Year and two-time SCAC Women's Coach of the Year, was the driving force behind the project.

"Greg has been very enthusiastic about making improvements for the benefit of the golf team ever since he got to Southwestern 10 years ago," says A.J. Brune.

The simulators were installed in the Corbin J. Robertson Center this summer. In addition to practicing their swing, student-athletes can download and analyze their performances, compete against teams around the country, organize virtual tournaments, and play hundreds of different courses.

"We're excited for the next generation of Southwestern athletes who will be able to hone their game on the simulator in preparation for achieving their best performances on the course," says Kevin Peesker, whose son, Matthew Peesker '25, was a four-year member of the men's golf team.

Hal Chappelle's grandson, Sam McClure '27, is a current member of the team. Chappelle notes that the simulators will also help with recruitment.

"Southwestern is already a great place for an athlete to attend," Chappelle says. "Having this capability will only make the program better."

New Scoreboard Elevates the Player and Fan Experience

Southwestern's investment in Pirate Athletics continued last fall with the installation of a new scoreboard in the Corbin J. Robertson Center, home to the basketball and volleyball teams. The new scoreboard, which replaced a 31-year-old model, was made possible by gifts from Aramark and Hewlett Automotive Group.

"I have felt a connection to Southwestern ever since my family moved to Georgetown in 1971," says Don Ross Hewlett, owner of the Hewlett Automotive Group. "I essentially grew up on the campus. We played on the fields, went to the games, and ran around the fountains. As long-time supporters of Southwestern and the greater Georgetown community, we're proud to help the University build on its legacy and support future generations of student-athletes."

Alumni Couple, Trustee Pledge Gifts for New Sports Complex

Southwestern's new multi-purpose sports complex continues to move closer to reality thanks to generous gifts from donors. The University is in the final stretch of its fundraising campaign, with \$8.5 million now committed for the \$9.2 million facility.

In April, Kevin '81 and Elizabeth '84 Dice pledged a \$1 million gift toward the construction of the facility. In recognition of their generosity, the field at the new complex will be named after the alumni couple. "We are honored to support Southwestern and invest in such a space that will bring students, athletes, and the entire University together," Kevin and Elizabeth Dice say. "Our hope is that this field becomes a place where a sense of community is fostered, traditions are built, friendships are formed, and school spirit thrives for generations to come."

Two months later, Trustee Brent Austin pledged a \$500,000 challenge match in honor of his wife, Joanne Powers Austin '74. "This project is a defining moment for Southwestern," Austin says. "Joanne's legacy as a proud alumna and lifelong supporter of this University inspires me every day. I hope this challenge encourages others to join us in creating something truly transformative for generations of students."

Located on the site of the current football practice field east of campus, the new multi-purpose sports complex will be funded 100% by philanthropy. The full scope of the project includes a grandstand, a stadium press box, a synthetic turf playing surface, a locker room, and a concourse area. Construction is expected to begin this fall.

“My experience has been beyond words,” Dang says.

That type of unforgettable adventure is exactly why Charlie Olson '78 and Kris Kaiser Olson established the Kris Kaiser Olson Endowed Scholarship for Study Abroad at Southwestern. The scholarship helps cover non-tuition expenses so students can immerse themselves in the culture of their host country.

“There’s so much more to studying abroad than sitting in a classroom in another country,” Kris says. “All those informal experiences, from eating new food to exploring museums, are equally as valuable.”

For Charlie, the scholarship is also an opportunity to give back to the university that gave him so much.

“Southwestern gave me confidence that I could understand and work in a complicated world,” he says. “Implicit in the teaching was the message that we should go into the world and leave it better than we found it. Through this scholarship, we’re hoping to support students who otherwise may not be able to experience the full benefits of international travel.”



Snead Institute Funds Sustainability Research in Switzerland

This summer, Professor of Environmental Studies Joshua Long led 15 Southwestern students on an unforgettable study abroad experience through Switzerland. Held in the Italian-speaking city of Lugano, this four-week, four-credit program allows students to study sustainability and development in one of the most environmentally friendly nations in the world.

“By providing students with experiential, place-based learning, the program transforms how they engage with sustainability not only in their scholarship, but also in their everyday lives,” Long says.

The course also develops students’ research capacity. Assignments emphasize observation, analysis, and critical thinking.

“On this trip, I have gotten the opportunity to explore Swiss water conservation strategies and how they may converge and differ from those in the United States and Texas,” says Sarah Ventimiglia ’25. “This once-in-a-lifetime opportunity has allowed me to take my interest to new heights, equipping me with a global perspective to bring to a career in water conservation or environmental sociology after graduation.”

Several students received support for their research projects through the Snead Institute.

“Our father and grandfather, Ned Snead, founded the Snead Institute because he was passionate about international understanding and cooperation. He was also a great fan of Southwestern University,” says Snead family representatives of the institute. “We are proud to continue his tradition by sponsoring the Southwestern Environmental Studies Program. It is our belief that a sustainable future demands the involvement of the best and the brightest youth of all countries working together to solve global challenges.”

Jameson 5K Celebrates 25th Anniversary with Ambitious Goal

Growing up, Kenda Jameson Evans '92, who now serves on Southwestern's Alumni Council, and her brother, Jaysn Jameson '90, did everything together. They had the same interests, the same hobbies, and the same values. When it came time to decide on a college, it's no surprise they chose the same university.

Kenda and Jaysn thrived at Southwestern, where they both majored in chemistry and immersed themselves in everything the University has to offer. When Jaysn died in a scuba accident in 1991, Kenda was devastated—and determined to honor his memory. Together with family and friends, she established the Jaysn Flynn Jameson Memorial Scholarship Fund, which supports students majoring in the natural sciences with demonstrated financial need.

“Jaysn had a magnetism about him that drew people in. He was an amazing human being,” Kenda says. “And he loved Southwestern. We wanted to continue his legacy.”

Kenda organized the first Jameson 5K Fun Run/Walk in 2001 to help endow the scholarship, which has been awarded to 62 students so far. The race has since raised more than \$260,000. This fall, in honor of the event’s 25th anniversary, Kenda has set a goal to raise an additional \$40,000 to get the total amount up to \$300,000.

“This will be the last Jameson 5K,” she says. “It has been a labor of love. I want this one to be bigger and better than ever.”

The race will take place Oct. 25 on the Southwestern campus. Kenda hopes more than 250 people will register.

“There will definitely be a hole in my heart when it’s over,” she says. “Hopefully Jaysn is proud.”

Alumni Council Helps Retiree Keep Up with University Happenings

Now retired after a long career with J.P. Morgan Wealth Management, Joe Bourne '81 is happily done with meetings. But there's one meeting he never wants to miss: the three-times-a-year gathering of Southwestern's Alumni Council.

Student Analysts Turn Classroom Learning into Real-World Success

Southwestern's Financial Analyst Program (FAP) enables students to gain invaluable hands-on experience in portfolio management and financial analysis. Through this program, students not only strengthen their understanding of investment principles, but also develop critical teamwork and problem-solving skills that prepare them for success in the financial industry.

FAP team members manage the University's Student Investment Fund under the guidance and advice of the faculty in the Department of Economics and Business. In 2024, the fund had an outstanding year, delivering a 24.63% annual return, its second-highest return since inception. This performance outpaced the S&P 500's 24.01% return and significantly exceeded the portfolio's 15.76% benchmark, demonstrating the strength of the team's investment strategy and risk management approach.

Team members also participated in the Student Managed Investment Fund Consortium (SMIFC) conference in Chicago, Illinois, for the fourth consecutive year. This event offered a unique opportunity for students to network with peers, exchange strategies, and gain fresh perspectives from industry experts.


